

SHARE OF AFT IN DEVELOPMENT FINANCE AND FIXED CAPITAL FORMATION (%)








TRADE FACILITATION INDICATORS, 2017 (0-2)





TRADE COSTS (ad-valorem, %)



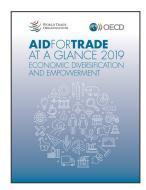
