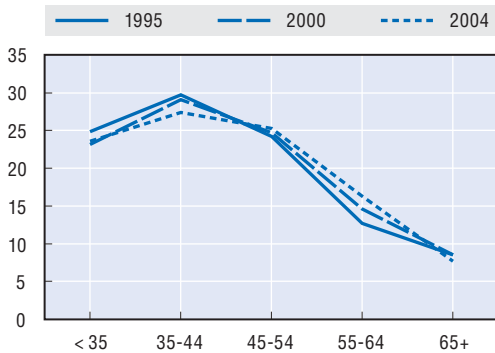

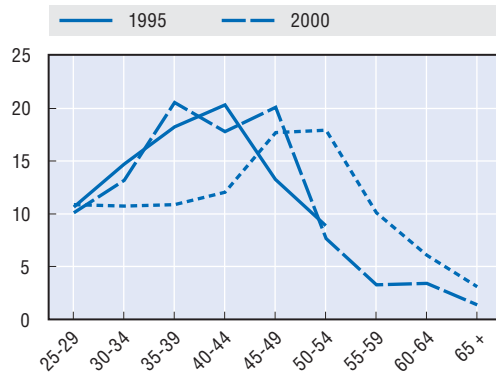
### Age Distribution of Physician and Nurse Workforce in Selected OECD Countries, 1995, 2000 and 2005

Australia, employed medical practitioners by age group, 1995, 2000 and 2004



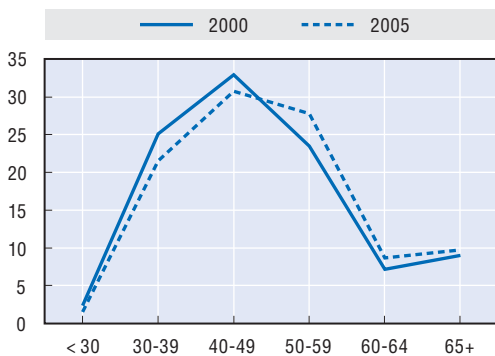

Belgium, health professionals by age group, 1995, 2000 and 2005



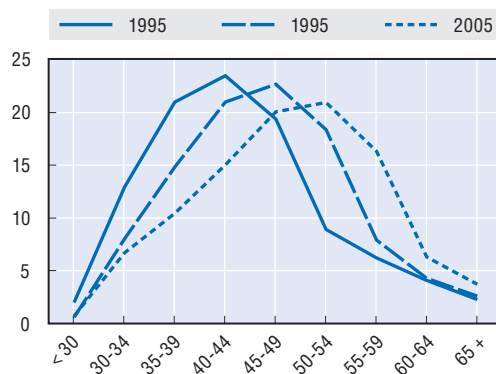

Canada, registered doctors by age group, 2000 and 2005



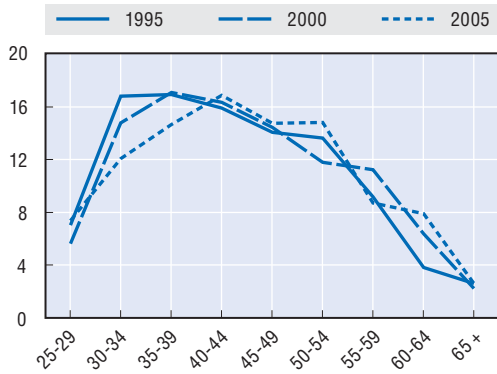

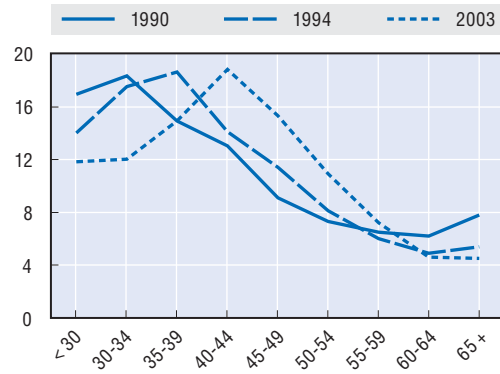

**Germany, health professionals by age group, 1995, 2000 and 2005**



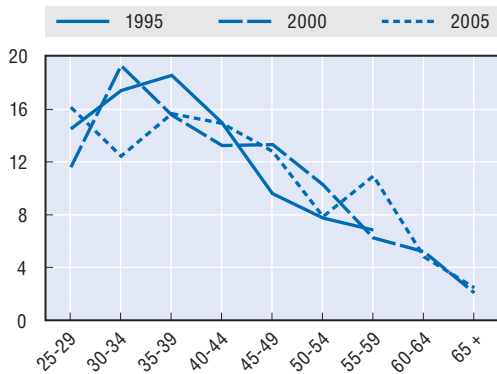

**New Zealand, active medical workforce by age group, 1990, 1994 and 2003**



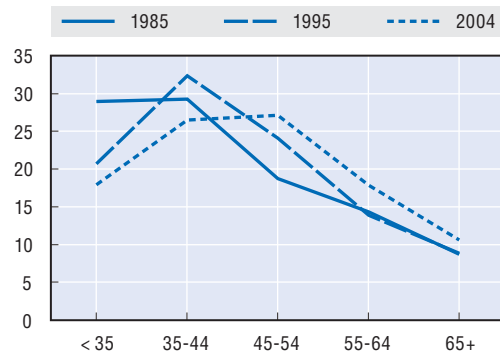

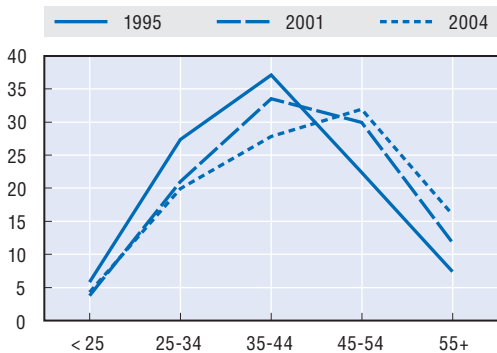

**United States, active physicians by age group, 1985, 1995 and 2004**



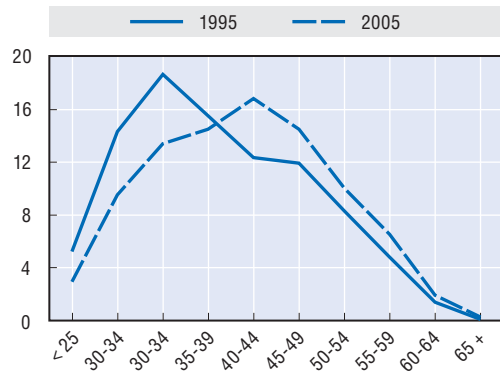

**Australia, employed registered nurses by age group, 1995, 2001 and 2004**



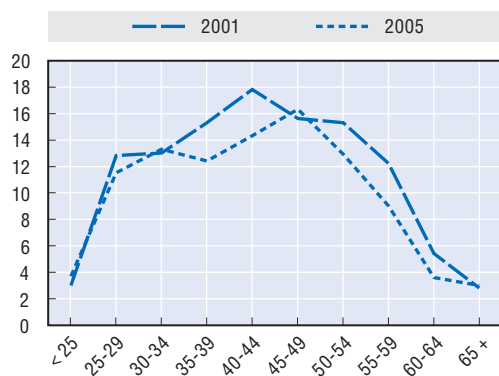

**England, qualified nurses midwives and health visiting staff, 1995 and 2005**



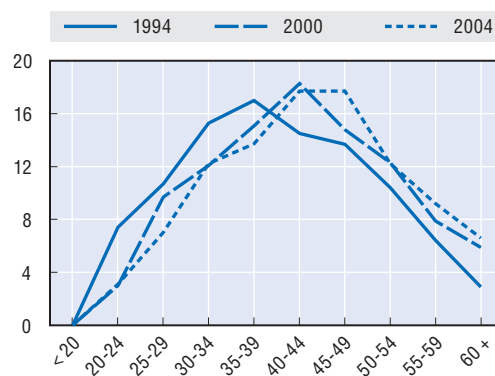

2001 and 2005



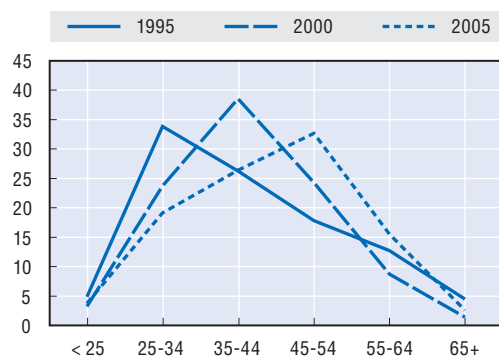

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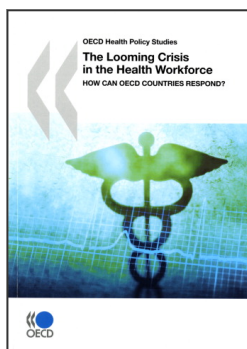


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
